Letter From the Founder



Dear Friends,

Sasamani Foundation had its genesis in 2011 when I visited my son in Tanzania.

After spending three weeks in Bagamoyo with my son in a service organization, I traveled the country for two weeks alone. Before flying out, I had a day in Dar es Salaam, and decided to visit the yacht club, as my immediate preceding life was on the water in the sailing industry.

As fate would have it I met a few people who showed me around the yacht club who were deeply involved in non-profit, or were connected to USAID. That short time planted a seed that would become the Sasamani Foundation.

In the earliest days we had Elias Mmbaga whom I met in Bagamoyo, a few close friends in the US with NGO experience, and a Canadian high school student whom I met in Bagamoyo.

Our small team put together the paperwork to register as an NGO in the US and in Tanzania in 2012.

We formulated initial plans to learn and listen to those who were working on the ground in Tanzania. I had great fortune to meet several people working in all levels of the nonprofit world. This diverse set of contacts helped to shape our early direction and thought processes. And we were fortunate in the extreme to have Gladness Kulola come onboard as Education Director, and to develop a Tanzanian board to work with the staff and the US board.

The major points we learned, and followed to initiate programming were: 1. Do No Harm; and 2. With Not For. We live by that to this day. Our role is to help facilitate the change the staff and Board in Tanzania have determined is the best way forward for Tanzania.

In the ten years we have been working in Tanzania, we have been so fortunate to meet, in some very unique ways, people such as Erica Mohr, who became our first US Executive Director. From the early days of going to the Big Y supermarket to send Elias funds via Western Union, to today where our banks in the US communicate with those in Tanzania, so much has changed.

Since 2012, the Sasamani Foundation has provided access to over \$2 million to build educational and employment programming in East Africa. Additionally, over \$2 million in value of the volunteer hours has us operating at a high and mature level today. To me, it is remarkable in almost every conceivable way. Our successes - the Tanzanian and the US staff, board and volunteers have created something which exceeds anything I thought possible. And, we are only getting started!

To all of those who have contributed over the past decade, and there are so many of you, contributing in so many ways, you have my deepest gratitude for making these achievements possible.

Dear Sasamani Friends,

I am grateful to report the Sasamani Foundation's continued success in 2021. The support of both new and loyal donors and the dedication of our staff, volunteers, interns and Boards of Directors in Tanzania and in the US enables Sasamani to positively impact the lives of women and girls in East Africa.

2021 was a year of exciting "firsts" for Sasamani:

- In August, we held our first ever **virtual Women Leading Change Program** for 15 East African leaders. The Women Leading Change team successfully adapted to ever-changing circumstances.
- For the first time in our history, **100% of Sasamani-sponsored students remained enrolled for the entire academic year**. Many of our students grapple with challenges that can make it extremely difficult to remain in school.
- **All Sasamani-sponsored secondary school students performed at the top of their class** in their National Exams. These results are crucial as they determine the students' subsequent educational opportunities.
- 2021 marked the **inaugural year of our partnership with Connecticut College's Walter Commons for Global Study and Engagement** for Sasamani's internship program.
- We held our **first bi-continental virtual board meeting**, bringing our Tanzanian and US Boards of Directors together in real-time.

- Sasamani celebrated a **record-breaking fundraising year**. We could not be more grateful to our donors for their generosity and commitment to advancing women and girls' empowerment.

I thank everyone involved with the Sasamani Foundation for your support and trust in the Sasamani mission. Together, we took another step towards a future in which all possibilities for women and girls in East Africa are equitable and attainable. I look forward to continuing this journey of progress together in 2022.

About The Program

The surest road out of poverty is education. The Sasamani Foundation provides holistic student sponsorships that focus on building self-reliance.

A \$30 monthly or \$360 annual donation covers a student's school fees from middle school through university and ensures each student's basic needs are met such as room and board, hygiene supplies, health insurance, school supplies, transportation, and access to a social worker. Each sponsor is linked to a student or multiple students. The Sasamani Foundation encourages and facilitates the exchange of letters between students and sponsors.

2021 Milestones

- All 75 Sasamani-sponsored students remained enrolled for the entire academic year. Many students grapple with challenges and responsibilities that can make it extremely difficult to fully concentrate on their studies and remain in school.
- All Sasamani-sponsored middle school students performed at the top of their class in their National Exams.
- Sasamani provided its three partner middle schools with soap and water buckets as part of the schools' Covid-19 prevention programs.
- 100% of the students are sponsored through the sponsorship program directly. In 2022, Sasamani will recruit 25 more middle school students and partner with a fourth middle school.

Empower: Women Leading Change

About The Program

The Women Leading Change initiative is a transformative leadership program specially designed for East Africa's emerging women leaders. In collaboration with the University of Dar es Salaam in Tanzania, we designed this program to build specific skills and mindsets necessary to lead change in East Africa.

Women Leading Change gathers influencers and experienced educators from academic institutions such as the London Business School (UK), the University of Pennsylvania (US), the University of Agder (Norway), and the University of Dar es Salaam Business School (Tanzania). This international team collaborates closely to develop a culturally relevant curriculum.

Our graduates will maximize their potential, lead positive change and economic growth, and create a prosperous future for their families and their communities.

2021 Milestones

- The international Women Leading Change team in Tanzania, Kenya, the UK, and the US successfully adapted to the ever-changing circumstances in 2021 and designed an all virtual Women Leading Change program.
- In August, 15 East African women leaders participated and graduated from the three-day online, transformative leadership program.
- In December, 14 Women Leading Change 2021 graduates completed four months of one-on-one coaching sessions.
- The 2021 graduates form a digitally-connected alumnae group to support one another on their journeys of applying their lessons in their daily lives and achieving their personal leadership goals

In 2021, we started to refine Sasamani's Employment program to be more aligned with our strategic objectives. As part of Sasamani's Theory of Change process, we conducted interviews with the tailors in the Employment program to get a deeper understanding of their needs. As a result of this thorough process, we are looking to shift the focus of our approach from creating demand for products to building capacity.

We are currently exploring opportunities to partner with the Escala Business School and to work with the University of Dar es Salaam's Entrepreneurship Center to design a sustainable program focused on building business acumen and targeted to women entrepreneurs in Bagamoyo, Tanzania.

We partner with Connecticut College and annually provide students with the opportunity to intern with Sasamani, supporting the operations of our organization and contributing their unique talents and perspectives towards our mission.

With Sasamani's internship program we hope to foster a new generation of young people who are passionate about making responsible, sustainable, and empowering change. We bring the interns together with our staff, beneficiaries, Boards of Directors and volunteers to work together towards a common goal of empowering women and girls in East Africa.



2021 Milestones

- 2021 marked the inaugural year of our partnership with Connecticut College's Walter Commons for Global Study and Engagement.
- Three talented and passionate Connecticut College students took part in our virtual internship program.
- One student-intern took part in the Women Leading Change committee and developed and conducted a survey to measure the impact of the virtual Women Leading Change program.
- One student-intern supported the Education program by conducting interviews with the sponsored students to advise on group counseling subjects, optimizing tools for impact measurement, and writing blog posts.
- One student-intern worked on content development for Sasamani's online channels, including the development of a video about the women entrepreneurs in Bagamoyo who produced the soaps Sasamani provided to the partner schools.
- The student-interns worked together on the successful 2021 Sasamani Sponsorship Campaign. 100% of the students are now sponsored through the sponsorship program directly.

Theory of Change: How Does Change Happen?

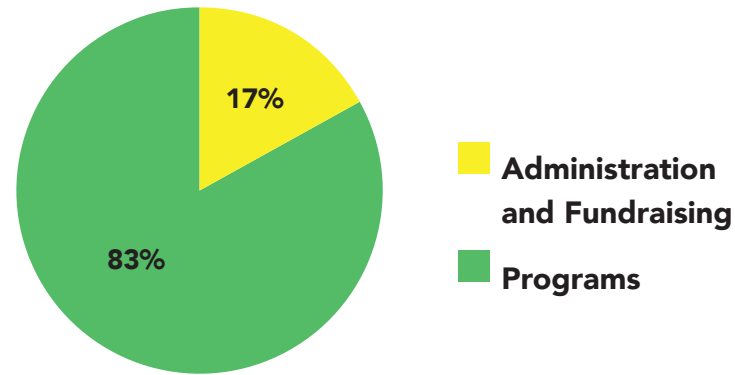
This is a question that organizations like Sasamani must ask themselves in order to successfully accomplish their stated Mission. A Theory of Change is a methodology used by mission-driven organizations to illustrate how their activities are contributing to their desired end state. It serves as a guiding roadmap, outlining how change is made possible through a series of thoughtfully-designed activities and subsequent outcomes.

In 2021, the Sasamani team embarked on creating our own Theory of Change, with involvement and input from the entire Tanzanian and U.S. Board of Directors and Sasamani staff. The team spent the year collaborating and discussing questions like: “What are the primary barriers to education, employment and empowerment for women and girls in East Africa we are aiming to overcome?”; “What is the long-term impact we hope to achieve?”; “What are the shorter-term outcomes that will make this change possible?”; and “How are our program activities thoughtfully designed to accomplish these outcomes?” The results of this collaborative process include the creation of refreshed and re-clarified Mission and Vision statements; a codified breakdown of the Outcomes that will allow us to achieve our Mission; and a means to approach our program design to ensure all Sasamani Activities are collectively accomplishing our desired impact.

Since our founding in 2012, Sasamani’s programs have been thoughtfully and carefully designed

through close collaboration between our Tanzanian and U.S. Board and team members, and grounded in our foundational belief of “with, not for”. Creating a Theory of Change has taken Sasamani another leap forward in our trajectory of responsible and sustainable change-making, and reflects our organization’s continued commitment to dismantling the systems that diminish women’s and girl’s opportunities to achieve their full potential in East Africa. Going forward, the Theory of Change is to serve as our North Star, ensuring everything Sasamani does continues to be done with integrity and shared purpose towards our Mission: to increase access to education and employment opportunities for women and girls in East Africa, empowering them to shape their own futures and cultivate positive change in their communities.
